

Bi-Annual Commission Report Summary (*Please see 2019 Bi-Annual Stats) July 2019-December 2019

WIC: We continue to provide supplemental nutritional foods, nutrition education, support, and referrals to clients, to local Brookings county resources. We continue to market to various organizations in the Community. The WIC program includes a variety of educational topics not limited to nutrition. These topics include items such as development, literacy, and oral health.

Immunizations: Flu shots are offered from September to June. We continue our monthly focus on reaching out to families of infant, children, and adolescents that are not up to date on recommended immunizations. We continue to refer clientele to establish a primary care provider and attend Well Child visits routinely, as well as offering immunizations in office. We continue to offer multiple payment options.

School Services: The 2019-2020 fall contracted school services were completed and we are working with these schools to schedule the spring school services.

Baby Care/Prenatal Education: We continue to meet with all pregnant women monthly and provide prenatal education and breastfeeding education and referrals.

Infant Mortality: We continue to provide safe sleep education and options to clients, including pack and plays, smoking cessation, immunizations, safe sleep, and breast feeding.

Staffing: We continue to be fully staffed. We have assisted in training new staff from other counties within our Region as well as covering offices located in other counties as needed, for reasons including staff on leave.

Staff training/Continuing Education: All staff are up to date on training.

Community Involvement: Monthly Child Protection Service meeting, Monthly POD Planning (Points of Dispensing) meeting, Quarterly Local Emergency Planning Committee meetings, Local clinic and hospital support and collaboration, Immunization support including biannual immunization meeting with local entities (clinic staff, school nurses), Participation support involving a variety of entities including Department of Human Services, Housing, and resource sharing and involvement.
